Sadly, like many other schools, we are no longer able to source the woolen tartan that has been used to make our senior winter kilts. This supply issue is affecting many schools across New Zealand.

We turned to our designers and asked them to create an alternative with the same sharp look, added comfort and durability, and at a more affordable price. We are thrilled with the skirt, including pleats, that will be available for purchase from the beginning of 2025. This replaces the senior kilts. The junior pinafore remains the same.

Next year all Year 5 girls will be required to wear the new skirt with the winter uniform. Those girls in Years 6, 7 and 8 may continue wearing their kilt, as we are aware that some families have only recently purchased them and at a considerable cost. Any senior girls may purchase the next skirt, should they wish. The cost will be somewhere between \$80 - \$90 and will be confirmed in time.

Room 2 have started learning about how our school and town are affected by rubbish and waste.


One of the R's we are learning about is 'reduce'. We are thinking about reducing our waste.

We wonder about how much our pile would grow if we collected lunch rubbish everyday of the week. This was the rubbish we collected just from Room 2's lunch boxes. We wonder how much rubbish do Rm1, Rm3, Rm4, Rm6, Rm7 and Rm8 make?... We wonder how much rubbish do the teachers produce? We wonder would the rubbish pile be 7 times bigger? We wonder if we can do anything to reduce the amount of rubbish we make?

Rubbish means things we won't use again and we are ready to throw away.

In our writing we are working on writing narratives and in our reading we are looking at characters and plot features. This is such a fun term bursting with learning! We can't wait!
